I. Education Standards & Objectives

This program is designed to address the following Standards for Music Education:

Nebraska Fine Arts Standards

- FA 2.4.2 Students will sing and/or play instruments to a variety of music that includes music elements of rhythm, pitch, dynamics, and form.

Through classroom activities and concert attendance, students will:

CREATE

• Students will be invited to play a hand-made instrument during the concert.

SING

• During the performance, your students will be encouraged to sing "Twinkle Twinkle Little Star".

PARTICIPATE

• Mission Imagination is an interactive production! Students should be ready to participate and follow along in several guided activities.

LISTEN

• Make sure students are familiar with the pieces that will be played during the performance.

CONDUCT

• Students will have the chance to conduct along with the Omaha Symphony. Try your hand at conducting before coming to the concert.

II. Story Synopsis: Mozart's Missing Memory

Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart is preparing to premiere his latest composition with the Omaha Symphony. While at rehearsal, Mozart seems reluctant to hand the music over to the Maestro. Instead, he discovers that the symphony will also be performing a handmade instrument concerto with some very talented soloists – your students! Mozart asks the soloists if he may perform the piece with them.

Still stalling for time, Mozart reveals that he has not actually finished the composition for the orchestra – and the concert is only hours away! Mozart promises a very concerned Maestro that there is nothing to fear. He will finish the piece immediately – after all, he is Mozart! Before he can complete the composition, however, there is an accident, and Mozart is stricken with amnesia!

The orchestra and Maestro Alejandro decide to teach Mozart about aspects of music in hopes that it will bring back his memory. They proceed to teach the very confused composer about **dynamics** (Overture: The Marriage of Figaro,) **pitch** (Symphony No. 41,) and **tempo** ("Fin ch'han dal vino," from Don Giovanni.) They even teach Mozart about accompaniment (Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star – Sing Along)!

It will take the help of everyone at the rehearsal to get Mozart's memory back and finish the piece in time for the concert!

III. Repertoire Listening Guide

Embedded in the song titles are hyperlinks to YouTube. Most of the videos are likely too long for younger children in their entirety, so use what works for your students. They will love moving to the music!

Bologne: Overture, L'Amant Anonime

• This is the first piece of the Mission Imagination concert and we will hear a different part later in the program. Joseph Bologne was a contemporary of Mozart's. They may have even known each other!

Mozart: Overture, The Abduction from Seraglio

• Play along handmade instrument piece - *Don't forget your instruments!* Shake, scrape, or strike along with the recording to get ready to find the beat with the symphony at the concert!

Mozart: Overture, The Marriage of Figaro

• This piece is how we introduce dynamics in the concert. Have students notice how the conductor and musician's movements and expressions change when they play soft and loud.

Mozart: Symphony No. 41 in C Major, K.551, "Jupiter" Allegro Vivace

• This video focuses on the pitch using a graphic score to illustrate variations in pitch and is a great visual companion to listening to high and low.

Mozart: "Fin ch'han dal vino," from Don Giovanni

• This video focuses on tempo and features a staged performance from the Metropolitan Opera's production of *Don Giovanni*. While Mission Imagination doesn't feature a baritone, this video offers context-building for students learning about Mozart and his pieces!

Bologne: Overture, L' Amant Anonime (2nd Excerpt)

• We will revisit Bologne for our conduct-along in the concert! This video offers close-ups of the musicians playing so they can concentrate on conducting the orchestra when we are together.

Mozart: Symphony No. 38 in D Major, K 504, "Prague", Presto

• Mozart's completed finale for the orchestra! We hear samples of this piece throughout the concert as we help Mozart remember how to be a composer.

Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star – Don't miss these videos! This is our sing-along piece for the concert.

IV. Composer Biographies



Joseph Bologne

Born in 1745 on the French Caribbean Island of Guadeloupe, Bologne was the first classical composer of African descent to receive widespread popularity and recognition. He was also known for being a virtuoso violinist, champion fencer and a Colonel in the French Revolution. He collaborated with Franz Hyden and later composed his first notable set of six string quartets which launched his career, he would continue to compose orchestral music and later opera. Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart

Born January 27, 1756, in Salzburg, Austria, Mozart was a child prodigy already at the age of five playing proficient piano and violin as well as composing and performing his compositions for royalty. Mozart was a prolific classical composer and is considered the most influential of his time. He is known for composing symphonies, operas, sonatas, concertos, chamber music, and choral music.
